This will support the Forum's efforts to address concerns about the lack of transparency and myths that undermine the credibility of the Annual Meeting.

The Forum hopes that the purpose and spirit of Davos will inspire and unite participants and help to preserve and strengthen the positive potential of the Annual Meeting for public and private sector dialogue, understanding and collaboration. In an increasingly complex, fragmented and polarized world, this mission and purpose have never been more important.
